

Are You the Older Brother in Today's Parable?

In today's Gospel, we hear how the older brother stayed with his father, enjoyed the benefits of home, but obviously did not share the heart of his father. Work on the farm to him was a drudgery not a delight. He didn't view the father as generous, but as stingy, and a harsh taskmaster. You see his animosity surface when he describes his obedience to the father as "slaving for you all these years!"



Unfortunately, there are many among us like this older brother. They may do all the right things outwardly, but inwardly their hearts are elsewhere. When this older brother casts his disparaging re-

marks at his younger brother coming home, we get a glimpse of how he might have spent his half of the inheritance were he not so concerned with keeping up appearances! But keeping up the appearances could not disguise the anger and animosity he now displays to the father. "You never gave me anything!" is the cry of a selfish, self-seeking son whose jealousy over the father's acceptance of this prodigal brother is painfully revealed.

Many prodigals cannot bring themselves to return to the Father because they cannot face the elder brothers who are quick to judge, quick to criticize, and quick to shoot those who are wounded. To those 'elder brothers', please realize that you are a member of God's family because of grace, not because you are a 'goody-two sandals'! Recognize that it takes the same embrace from the Father to accept you as it does to accept the wayward. Stop standing in the way, and join the party!

And to all the 'prodigals' out there, hurry to the Father, and don't let the criticism of your elder brothers stop you!

<u>To all ice fishermen</u> ~ Here are some more good safety tips:

- **Know the ice**. Before you go out, make sure it is safe. Clear blue ice is generally the strongest.
- **Dress for success**. You never know what the weather will bring, so be sure to dress warmly.
- Food for thought. A couple of snacks and a bottle of water or a thermos of coffee can help replace lost energy, and can even help you survive if you are out longer than expected.
- Phone home. Always carry a cell or satellite phone so you can call for help if the need arises.
- **Stay tuned**. Make sure your machine (snowmobile, ATV, etc.) is in tip-top running order before you head out.
- Pack light, pack right. Don't load up with unnecessary tackle especially if you're fishing for perch or bass.
- Cutting edge tools. Keep your ice augers and spud bars well-honed (sharpened) and covered when not in use.
- Shacking up. Use a portable ice hut which can give you the flexibility to go where the fish are and keep you warm and comfortable. (Permanent huts are okay, too.)
- Sweet heat. When the mercury plummets, you'll want to be inside some type of shelter with a more powerful heat source. Whichever type and model you choose, make sure it is working properly and you have plenty of fuel.



Tony and the White Ribbons

Today we are going to hear the story of "Tony and the White Ribbons". It is the story of a father's love. The story begins with a young man named Tony. Tony lived in a small, quiet town. One day he decided that he was not going to be trapped in that little boring town all his life, he was going to run away from home and go to the big city miles away. There he could experience all of the excitement that life could offer. That afternoon he told his father he was going to the store and he took off for the big city instead.

When Tony got to the big city he began to live a wild life. He made it a special point to do all of the things that his father always tried to teach him were wrong and would lead to problems and destruction in his life. He did some pretty bad things and eventually had to spend time in jail. While Tony was in there, he had a lot of time to think about what he had done with his life. All of a sudden home sounded so good. He had made a complete mess of his life because he disobeyed. As he sat there in jail, he broke down sobbing. He decided to write his father a letter asking if he could come home when he was released. He asked his father to tie a white ribbon on the tree in front of their house if he was

forgiven and welcome to return home. As the train approached his hometown neighborhood, he would check for the ribbon on the tree and know if he were welcome.

Tony was nervous as he rode the train toward his home. He was even afraid to look for the ribbon on the tree, so he asked the man next to him to look for him. Was there any chance his father would allow him to return home, or even ever forgive him for bringing shame to the family? As the train passed through the town, Tony asked the man if he could see the ribbon on the tree. The man told Tony he didn't see one ribbon on the tree. Tony's heart sank. Then the man said, "I do not see one but many. In fact, the whole tree is covered with white ribbons." Tony looked up and saw the tree completely white with ribbons and his father beneath it waving his arms and running toward the train to greet him.

If the story sounds familiar, it is. It is the story about a prodigal son and his father's love. It is a story that gives us a beautiful picture of God's heart of love towards each one of us. He loves all the lost sons and daughters of the world. He is the great Father full of love and forgiveness.
