## 5 Things We Can Learn from Lilies

### 1. Lilies are the planting of God and not man.

God will supernaturally and by His grace plant beautiful things in unexpected places. Lilies grow in some of the strangest environments on earth; the desert, deep shade, the hot sun, and even the Arctic tundra. A lesson we can take from this is that God can grow flowers in every corner on earth. He will cause His wildflowers to grow in places that put up the strongest barriers to Christianity on earth. No climate is too harsh for God to grow things.

### 2. The study of lilies has proven to be good for the heart.

In Matthew 6: 28-30, Jesus uses the observation and study of the lily as a remedy for worry. Scientists who study the chemical composition of the plant have found strong links between worry, stress, and a narrowing of the arteries of the heart. The substance convallatoxin present in the "Lily of the Valley" is similar to the medicine digitalis, mainly used for acute and chronic heart failure. Worry is bad for you; learning from lilies spiritually and actually is good for your heart health.

### 3. Lilies are hardier than you think, and so are you.

The environment in which you live does not determine whether or not you will bloom, but the person you are inside determines that. Better yet, the God who is inside you (if you are a Christian), can bloom in any environment. In the worst of places, you can be an oasis of refreshment.

### 4. God has placed within lilies the principle of life.

On the lawns of many homes, a lot of wild lilies grow -- some in the most awkward of places, that make it very difficult to mow sections of the grass. Yet every year no matter how tenacious one is in cutting them down, the lilies come back and glorify the yard in the Spring. It is called the principle of life, and the fact of the matter is that the principle of life is greater than the principle of death. Even as God has placed within the lily the principle of life, so has He placed it in you!

### 5. You can expect regular seasons of refreshment and revival, and your needs will be met.

God waters the lily and provides it with such nutrients as it needs. It doesn't get those things by worrying, but by the gracious provision of an all-powerful God. The lily is just a shortlived decoration on earth, but when we look at the beauty, care and genius that God employed to create them, we can extrapolate a wonderful faith building lesson: If God would put so much care into something that is a throw-away item, how much more will He act on behalf of those He loved so much He sent His son to die for them! When you want something to last you build it more durable, you use greater care with it. That is the main lesson of the lily. God put a lot of care into a decoration; He puts a lot more care into the people that He wants to fill His house.

# Don't Worry -- Put Your Trust in God

ne day a large group of people was gathered around Jesus on a hillside and He began to teach them. "Don't worry about whether you have enough food and drink, or enough clothes to wear," He said. "There are more important things in life than food and clothes." Then He went on to teach them a lesson about worry.

"Look at the birds in the air," Jesus said. "They don't worry where their next meal is coming from. They don't store up grain in barns. And yet, the Heavenly Father takes care of them. Surely you are worth more to him than a bird."

"And why worry about your clothing?" Jesus continued. "Look at the lilies of the field and how they grow. Why do you show your lack of faith by worrying about these things?"

Does this mean that we can sit around and wait for food and clothes to drop from the sky? No. God provides food for the birds, but He doesn't throw it into their nest. It is up to them to go out and gather their food. God provides clothing for us by giving



us jobs so that we will have the money to buy clothes. Sometimes God provides clothes through friends and family who give us clothes. We need to have faith that God will provide, but we do have to do our part as well. Just remember -- our part does not include worry!

Father, we thank You for providing for our every need. Help us not to worry, but to have faith. Amen.
