Jesus' Family Tree: A Long List of People

These days on television, there is a commercial, aired many times a day, about finding your ancestry or where you come from. In today's Gospel story from St. Matthew, we hear the family record of Jesus Christ. It is a long list of people starting with Abraham and going through the generations up to Jesus' birth. We call this 'a family tree.'

We all have family trees. On each 'branch' are the names of our relatives, those who came before us. And there is probably a story with each of those names telling us about their individual lives. It is the same with Jesus' family tree. The list of names that we hear is about real people. It starts by stating that Jesus is the son of David, the son of Abraham. It is a list of people all with exciting stories of how they behaved towards God and how God responded to them. David was a shepherd boy who fought off the giant Goliath with just a sling and 5 stones. He played a musical instrument and wrote many

of the Psalms in the Bible. He also became the King of Israel and was known as a man after God's own heart.

Because Jesus was descended from David and Abraham we know that He was from the family which God's special Saviour was to come from. Matthew is pointing out that Jesus is the Saviour that had been foretold throughout all the stories of the people who had come before Him in His family tree. And God knew about every one of them; however, none of them knew how important he or she was, only God did. From the very beginning, God was making things ready for Jesus to come to be our Saviour. Each of those people was helping to make the family that Jesus needed here on earth.

Yes, Jesus had many ancestors. God wanted many different people in His family. He still wants people in Jesus' family today. He wants you. Happy Birthday Jesus!

The Nativity of Our Lord — An Unfathomable Mystery

"A strange and glorious mystery do I behold: the cave is heaven; the Virgin, the throne of the cherubim; the manger, a dwelling place in which is laid Christ, the God whom nothing can contain. Singing His praises, we magnify Him."

(Canon of Christmas)

The greatest and most profound mystery of the Christian faith is the mystery of the Incarnation of the Son of God. The eternal God becomes a little infant and does not cease to be God. "And the Word was made flesh and dwelt amongst us," says St. John the Evangelist (1:14). "The eternal God is born" — we sing in our most-beloved Ukrainian Christmas carol, Бог Предвічний (Boh Predveechniy). Christ's nativity is the cradle of our faith. Only faith is able to accept this unfathomable mystery, understand it and adore it.

In the first centuries, the holy Fathers of the Eastern Church accepted the mystery of the Incarnation of the Word of God with profound faith and great piety. Enraptured by this mystery, they have nothing but words of wonder for the most wonderful love of God, the sacrifice, humility, and poverty of the newly-born Messiah and Saviour. Moreover, from their lips come exclamations of heavenly joy that the time of salvation has come. "And this shall be a sign to you," said the angels to the shepherds, "you will find an infant wrapped in swaddling clothes and lying in a manger." (Luke 2: 12) These virtues will shine forth throughout his entire life; they will accompany him to the cross and to his grave.

St. John Chrysostom, pondering the manner of the Incarnation of the Son of God, says: "I see the carpenter and the manger, the child and the swaddling clothes, a birth of a Virgin deprived of all that is necessary; all is poverty; all is destitution. Do you no see the riches in that great poverty? How he who is rich became poor for our sake? How he had no bed, but was laid on a bare manger? O poverty! You are the source of riches! O immeasurable riches, which appear as poverty!"

St. Ephrem the Syrian summons us to imitate Christ's humility and love: "Today, when God has come to sinners, let not the righteous raise himself above the sinners. Today, the Lord of the universe has come to His servants, let also the master condescend to His servants in love. Today when the Rich One became poor for our sakes, let also the rich invite the poor to his table."

St. Gregory the Theologian, calling all to rejoice, says: "Christ has come in the flesh, rejoice with trembling and joy — with trembling because of sin — with joy, because of hope...Who will not adore the Eternal? Who will not praise the Last? Again, darkness is dispersed, and again light appears... For I am sure that the heavenly Powers rejoice and celebrate today with us, because they are full of love for man and for God."

The holy Father and authors of our Christmas services not only admire and extol the mystery of the Incarnation, but also summon us to give worship to Christ and bring Him the gifts of our faith and love, together with the Most Holy Virgin Mary, St. Joseph, the angels, the shepherds and the Wise Men.
