FOCUS ON THE GOSPEL READING

In today's Gospel reading, we hear Jesus pray just hours before He laid down His life for us. These were His priorities, His passions, His aims. As we look at His prayer, we discover that He is passionate, first, about His own glory; second, about the Church; and third, about reaching the world with the Gospel. You and I might summarize them this way: the glory of Christ, the body of Christ, and the work of Christ in the world. Those are Jesus' passions.

What we need to ask ourselves today is: Are these our passions? It's an important question because as Christians, we ought to make His passion our passion, His aims our aims, and, since He prayed for them so fervently, we should pray for them as well.

Will you stir up your passion for these things, and will you pray – this week, and with all your heart – that the name of Jesus be exalted, that the Church be kept safe from all harm, and that we be used by God to seek and to save the lost? These are the things for which Jesus prayed just hours before His death. They ought to be the things for which we pray and for which we live – each hour of each day of our lives.



St. George's Society



We Are Called To Be Separate From The World

ost of you know what salad dressing is and have seen it in a bottle. Salad dressing needs to be shaken up before it is poured out so that it is mixed together. When we look at a particular kind of salad dressing bottle like Italian that is made with oil and vinegar - rather than sour cream and mayonnaise like Ranch - the first thing that we notice is that the oil and vinegar remain separate from one another and somewhere in between are the spices and herbs that were added. So we have to shake the bottle up. And what happens next? The oil and vinegar and everything else included appear to become one. But have they stayed that way? If we let the bottle stand for a little while, the oil and vinegar become separate again, showing us that even when the ingredients were all mixed together, they were never really one.

This is a pretty good picture of what Jesus wants us to be like in this world we live in.

Before Jesus was crucified, He prayed for His disciples. He prayed that as they lived in the world, they would not become part of the world. He wanted them to add the gifts He had given them to the world, but He did not want them to become stained by the world. He wanted them to remain the person God made them to be. He wanted them to know His love and to share that love with others.

This prayer is for us too. Jesus said that just as His Father sent Him into the world, He has sent us into the world. We must live in this world, but Jesus has called us to be separate.



Dear Jesus, help us, as we live in this world, to remain faithful to Your call to be separate from the world.

Making Soap to the Glory of God

A sixteen-year-old boy was told by his father that he must leave home and make his way in the world. With all his possessions wrapped in a small bundle he started off. As he trudged along toward the big city he met a canal boat captain to whom he opened his heart.

The boy had learned soap making at home, so the captain, who was a noble Christian, gave him this advice: "Some one will be the leading soap maker in New York and it may as well be you as anyone. I hope it may. Be a good man; give your heart to Christ; give the Lord all that belongs to him of any fortune you earn; make an honest soap; give a full pound, and I am certain you will succeed."

They knelt on the towpath and the old man prayed. The boy went on to the big city. He followed the advice of his friend to the letter. He secured a position as a soap maker, was promoted rapidly, and finally became the owner of one of the nation's soap industries.

His name was William Colgate. At first he gave a tenth of all his income, then gave two tenths, then three, then four, then five. In middle age he settled all his plans for life and gave the whole of his income to the Lord.

"But this I say, He that soweth sparingly shall reap also sparingly; and he that soweth bountifully shall reap also bountifully" – 2 Cor. 9:6.
