

The Patron Saint for NOVEMBER

The Feast of St. Josaphat (November 12, Byzantine Rite; November 14, Roman Rite) Priest-martyr, is especially dear, glori-



ous and joyful for the faithful of the Ukrainian Catholic Church because it is a feast of our own Ukrainian Saint, our brother who is of our own flesh and bone; it is the

feast of a great Apostle and Martyr for the holy faith and the unity of the Churches.

Not only our own Ukrainian Catholic Church, but the entire Catholic Church venerates, praises, and prays to St. Josaphat and erects churches in his honour (currently 9 exist in Canada and the U.S. alone). His relics are enshrined in the centre of the Catholic world — the Basilica of St. Peter in Rome. St. Josaphat is the first Ukrainian Saint ever to be canonized by the Catholic Church. It is due to him and to his martyrdom that today we profess the true Christian faith and are members of the true Church of Christ.



St. Michael the Archangel: One of the Great Princes

Michael the archangel is described in the Bible (in the books of Daniel, Jude, and Revelation), as a warrior angel who engages in spiritual combat. The word archangel means "angel of the highest rank." Most angels in the Bible are portrayed as messengers, but Michael is described in all three books as contending, fighting, or standing against evil spirits and principalities. We do not have a full picture of any angel, and only two are named in the Bible (Gabriel is the other). Scripture only gives us hints of their movements during human events, but it is safe to say that Michael the archangel is a powerful being.

Despite his great power, Michael is still in total submission to the Lord. His dependence on the Lord's power is seen in Jude 1:9: "But when the archangel Michael contended with the devil and disputed against the body of Moses, he did not dare to bring a condemnation of slander against him, but said, 'The Lord rebuke you!"

There is a spiritual war being fought over the hearts and souls of mankind. Michael the archangel is a strong angelic prince who protects Israel and submissively serves God by doing battle against Satan. The Devil can do his worst, but "he [is] not strong enough" to conquer heaven's forces (Revelation 12:8).

Our next bingo session at Superior Shores is a matinée on **Thursday, November 16**. Those who have agreed to work at that event should be there no later than 12 noon.



The Rich Man and Lazarus

o you use an alarm clock to wake you up in the morning? A lot of alarm clocks have a button on them called a 'snooze' alarm. When your alarm goes off, you can hit that button and go back to sleep. In about ten minutes, the alarm will go off again. But there are two problems with snooze alarms. The first is that if you keep on hitting it, you may be late or miss out on something completely. The second is that if you keep hitting the snooze alarm, you may get so used to the sound of the alarm that you don't even hear it at all and you will sleep right through the alarm.

Did you know that God sometimes sounds a "wake up" alarm in our lives? He speaks to our heart and says, "It is time to wake up and follow Me." Some people hit the snooze button and say, "Not now Lord, call me again — a little bit later." Some people hit that "snooze button" so many times that they get to where they don't even hear God's voice. When they finally wake up, they find out that it is too late. That is what happened in our Bible story today.

Jesus told a story about a rich man who wore the finest clothes and lived in luxury. A beggar named Lazarus lay outside the rich

o you use an alarm clock to wake you up in the morning? A man's gate. Lazarus was hungry and his body was covered with sores. He was hoping that the rich man might have pity on him and that he might be able to satisfy his hunger with the leftovers from the rich man's table. But every day the Rich man passed by there are two problems with snooze alarms. The first is that

The Bible says that Lazarus died and went to heaven. The rich man also died, but he went to hell. In hell, he looked up and saw Lazarus in heaven with Abraham. He asked Abraham to let Lazarus dip his finger in water and come and touch it to his burning tongue, but Abraham said, "No." Then he reminded the rich man how he had enjoyed such good things on earth while Lazarus had nothing. The rich man then asked Abraham to allow Lazarus to go back to earth and warn his five brothers so that they would not end up in hell with him, but again, Abraham said, "No." The rich man finally woke up, but it was too late.

God is still sending "wake up" calls to people today. Let us pray that they will listen to His voice and follow Him before it is too late

For the rich man, it was too late to be rescued from his fate. He said "Send someone to warn my brothers, lest they also get in this state."


But God said "They have the Bible to tell them about Jesus to believe, By hearing God's word and accepting Him, salvation they can receive."
