

REFLECTING ON TODAY'S COMMEMORATION

N THE FIFTH SUNDAY OF THE GREAT LENT, the Church commemorates our venerable Mother, Mary of Egypt, who lived during the sixth century and passed away in a remarkable manner in the year 522 A.D.

She began her life as a young woman who followed the passions of the body, running away from her parents at age twelve for Alexandria. There she lived as a prostitute for seventeen years, refusing money from the men that she had relations with, instead living by begging and spinning flax.



One day, however, she met a group of young men heading toward the sea to sail to Jerusalem for the veneration of the Holy Cross. Mary went along for the ride, but when the group reached Jerusalem and went towards the church, Mary was prohibited from entering by an unseen force. After three such attempts, she remained outside on the church patio, where she looked up and

saw an icon of the Mother of God (*Theotokos* in Greek; *Bohorodytsya* in Ukrainian). She began to weep and prayed with all her might that the Theotokos might allow her to see the True Cross; afterwards, she promised, she would renounce her worldly desires and go wherever the Theotokos may lead her.

After this heartfelt conversion, she fled into the desert to live as an ascetic. For seventeen years, Mary was tormented by "wild beasts, mad desires and passions." After these years of temptation, however, she overcame the passions and was led by the Theotokos in all things.

The Church also celebrates her feast day on the day of her repose on April 1.

Brothers and sisters! When Christ came as a high priest of the good things that have come, then through the greater and perfect tent (not made with hands, that is, not of this creation), He entered once for all into the Holy Place, not with the blood of goats and calves, but with His own blood, thus obtaining eternal redemption. For if the blood of goats and bulls, with the sprinkling of the ashes of a heifer, sanctifies those who have been defiled so that their flesh is purified, how much more will the blood of Christ, who through the eternal Spirit offered Himself without blemish to God, purify our conscience from dead works to worship the living God!

At that time, Jesus took the twelve aside again and began to tell them what was to happen to Him, saying, "See, we are going up to Jerusalem, and the Son of Man will be handed over to the chief priests and the scribes, and they will condemn Him to death; then they will hand Him over to the Gentiles; they will mock Him, and spit upon Him, and flog Him, and kill Him; and after three days He will rise again."

James and John, the sons of Zebedee, came forward to Jesus and said to Him, "Teacher, we want You to do for us whatever we ask of You." And He said to them, "What is it you want Me to do for you?" And they said to Him, "Grant us to sit, one at Your right hand and one at Your left, in your glory." But Jesus said to them, "You do not know what you are asking. Are you able to drink the cup that I drink, or be baptized with the baptism that I am baptized with?" They replied, "We are able." Then Jesus said to them, "The cup that I drink you will drink; and with the baptism with which I am baptized, you will be baptized; but to sit at My right hand or at My left is not mine to grant, but it is for those for whom it has been prepared."

When the other ten heard this, they began to be angry with James and John. So, Jesus called them and said to them, "You know that among the Gentiles those whom they recognize as their rulers lord it over them, and their great ones are tyrants over them. But it is not so among you; but whoever wishes to become great among you must be your servant, and whoever wishes to be first among you must be slave of all. For the Son of Man came not to be served but to serve, and to give His life as a ransom for many."

Looking for God in the Time of Crises

Glory be to Jesus Christ!

Dear brothers and sisters in Christ!

When the first man, Adam, sinned, he departed from God's presence. The closeness that existed between man and God in Paradise was destroyed. A huge distance was created. It was to bridge this distance that Jesus came. He built a bridge that overcame the separation and brought God to each one of us. That bridge is the Cross. He is still on that bridge inviting us to draw near to God.

Many people in our modern time try to move away from God and even try to hide from Him. But God never moves from our side. We are the ones who move away from Him. And when we do, we experience something comparable to hell. God is trying to tell us that true happiness is to not to be found away from Him, but always in Him.

And we have a means of connection to God. Here is a good example...A spider slid down a thread from a barn roof. He built a small web, caught many flies, grew sleek and prosperous. One day, noticing the single thread stretching above the web, he said to himself, "How useless that thread is! Who needs it?" He snapped it, and immediately the whole web collapsed. It was a disaster!

The thread that holds us and keeps us in touch with God is prayer — talking to Him personally each day, walking with Him. But like the spider, we come to feel self-sufficient in our prosperity. "Prayer?" we say, "The Liturgy? Church? The Bible? Who needs it?" So, we snap the thread that keeps us in touch with God. We ask Him to leave, to depart from us, then we wonder why our universe begins to crumble around us; why there are wars and violence and hatred; why there is meaning-lessness and confusion and breakdowns.

Man is free to depart from God, but when he does, he gets into trouble. Yet God is present even in that hell, striving with man, trying to bring him an awareness of himself.

Let us stay focussed on God during this difficult time and HIS REDEMPTIVE POWER.

What True Christianity is Based Upon

God's Kingdom is unlike man's kingdoms and governments. In those organizations, the leaders establish their greatness by exercising authority over their subjects. Those leaders want to be served and honoured by those beneath them in the organization.

That's not the way it is in the kingdom of God. Christianity is based on service to others, so Christian leaders must be interested in serving rather than being served. Our example is Jesus Christ. He did not come to earth to be served by others, but to serve. (Phil. 2: 7). He came to offer His life as a sacrifice for our sins. You may never be asked to give your life for someone else, but that attitude of self-sacrificing service should be the mark of your Christianity.

"But among you it should be quite different. Whoever wants to be a leader among you must be your servant."



Climbing Down the Ladder of Greatness

n the Gospel for this Fifth Sunday of Great Lent, Jesus Land His disciples have one of the most memorable dialogues in the New Testament. While Jesus is speaking of His eventual death, James and John, two brothers who belong to Jesus' "inner circle" approach Him. These brothers had fiery personalities and zeal for the Lord. This leads them to ask a rather bold question: "Teacher, we want You to do for us whatever we ask of You." In other words, "Jesus, since we're your best friends, we want the best."

Since Jesus is wise and clever, He asks James and John, "What do you want Me to do for you?" The brothers reply, "Grant that we may sit, one on Your right and one on Your left, in Your glory." You see, James and John believed that Jesus was the Messiah, and they thought He was likely going to establish His kingdom when they reached Jerusalem. These brothers wanted the positions of highest honour. To be seated at the king's right hand was to take the most important position; the person seated at the left hand ranked just below that. James and John wanted the number one and number two spots.

Jesus had been teaching that another world existed beyond their present life and that some positions in God's kingdom were better than others. In fact, Jesus guaranteed the disciples twelve thrones in His coming kingdom as part of their reward for following Him. Yet, James and John said, "It's nice to \



make the top twelve, Jesus, but we have higher goals than those other ten guys. We would like to reserve a couple of the executive suites." Well, how insensitive can you get?! It's insensitive to Jesus, but it's also cruel to the other disciples. To James and John, life is like the reality show Survivor, and they've just voted the other ten disciples off the island.

In the end, Jesus wants these brothers and the rest of the His disciples to understand the need to climb down the ladder to greatness, and to concentrate on present service rather than future honour. This was Jesus' expectation of His disciples and of us. We too must be prepared to suffer. We must not want the benefits without the bruises, the glory without the bloodshed, the position without the persecution, or the plessings without the pumps. Those who follow Jesus seek to be humble, not proud of their status or accomplishments. If Jesus, as the Son of God, was willing to serve, how much more so should we!

Glory be to Jesus Christ! Glory forever!



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
