In today's Gospel account, a paralytic man is lowered down dramatically by a group of friends to position him in front of Jesus. These friends in the story are amazing. They are determined to get the paralytic help no matter what the cost. And it is *their* faith that becomes the occasion of the healing of the paralytic, not any faith that the paralytic expresses on his own. Once he is lowered into the house, the paralytic says and does nothing. In fact, he doesn't even ask to be healed. Not a word passes his lips. Instead, St. Mark tells us that when Jesus saw *their* faith, *meaning the faith of the friends*, He healed the paralytic.

We are meant to be friends like that in the church. Friends who are ready when the time is right to do everything we can to bring others to the place where help is available and even our faith can be used by God to bring healing. The friends in the story are, after all, the heroes of the piece. It is *their* faith that Jesus notices and that effects the healing of the paralytic. Fortunate are those who have friends who can point in the direction of help, or even bear us up on their shoulders in difficult times; friends so ready to help us when we are ready to ask for help that they will even break through the roof and lower us to the place and to the One who can bring us healing.

ore than a century and a half after his death, **Taras Shevchenko** (1814-1861) is still recognized as one of the world's greatest poets. Although the first translations of his works into other languages were published when he was still alive, it is only in the last sixty years that his words are appearing in most of the languages of the earth. And yet, despite the fact that his name was known to British Slavists long before the end of the 19th century and some of his poems were translated in English some 120 years ago, Shevchenko remains relatively unknown to the English-reading public.



That is not strange when we remember that Taras Shevchenko was the poet of the Ukrainians, and that he lived and created in a police state – tsarist Russia. His first small collection of verse titled "Kobzar", was published in 1840, and few of his other works were printed in magazines and periodicals. However, he received permission to republish "Kobzar" not long before his death – but all that was done so was heavily censored while most of his works, the most challenging of them, were circulated only in copies made by hand or passed orally from person to person. After the tsarist Russian empire was overthrown and Ukraine emerged from her centuries-long suppression, only then were the complete works of Taras Shevchenko, untouched by the censor's blue pencil, published and made available to his own people and to the world. His "Testament" has been translated into more than 60 languages and enjoys a status second only to Ukraine's national anthem.

Thus, it can be said of Taras Shevchenko, that he gave his talents and his life to the task of lifting up the Ukrainian people, and was himself lifted up to world recognition by them when they rose to their feet. The world significance of a writer, artist, thinker and statesman derives from the fact that the things he advocated for his own people in his own time are in harmony with and form part of the common striving of all people throughout the ages. "He забудьте, пом'янути незлим тихим словом ~ Forget not to remember me with a warm, gentle word." - from "Testament" (Zapovit, December 25, 1845)

Bringing Our Friends to Jesus: We Walk by Faith, Not by Sight

o you have any friends? Of course, you do! What do you like most or appreciate most in those friends? Probably a lot of things. We see a man in today's Gospel story who came to appreciate his friends very deeply. He was in a tough spot, but they were determined to help him out.

Picture this: a long time ago, during the time when Jesus was preaching inside, four friends came carrying a stretcher, one man at each corner. They could not even get in the front door, let alone anywhere near Jesus. They had one goal in mind...get their friend, who was paralyzed, to Jesus. If they could just get him to Jesus, they knew that everything would be OK. They knew that Jesus was the only one who could help him. Not doctors or books or medicine or exercise or wishes or trying hard or anything else could heal him; only Jesus could help their friend. They were desperate for Jesus' help, and they were determined to get it, so they cut a hole in the roof and lowered the paralyzed man down to Jesus.

This man's friends must have had great faith in Jesus. They believed in His love and willingness to help. They had heard

about Him and His message. Everything may have looked impossible and impassable, but they did not pay attention to how things looked; they knew that they must walk by faith. They did not get discouraged, and they did not give up. They had absolute confidence, complete faith in Jesus. How can we be good friends to others? By bringing them to Jesus. When we know someone who is going through a hard time, we can tell them about Jesus' love and His power to help them. We can pray with them and point them to Jesus.

As we obey and trust Jesus, we will see Him working in our lives. Just like the paralyzed man was in desperate need of help, we are all sinners, in desperate need of Jesus to forgive our sins and give us strength to live for Him. He is the answer to all of our questions and the solution to all of our problems. He is the God of the universe and worthy of all our trust. Let us trust Him with all our hearts as we walk by faith, not by sight.

"Therefore bear fruits worthy of repentance." Luke 3:8

epentance isn't fashionable these days. Many people want the blessing of having their sins forgiven without turning from their sins. But faith in Christ involves a change of mind about our sins and a renunciation of them. To repent means not only to renounce but to repair the damage done by sin. It is a change of mind that results in a change in one's life.

Much so-called repentance is telling God we will change if He will get us out of a tight spot. But its shallowness comes to light when the pressure is off. Two shipwrecked sailors had been drifting on a raft for days. In desperation, one began to pray, "God, I know I haven't lived a good life. I've lied and cheated and done many things I'm ashamed of. But if You save me, I promise I'll..." "Hold it!" interrupted his ship-mate. "Don't say another word! I just spotted land!"

When John the Baptist preached repentance, he called for right action. Soldiers, for example, were not to intimidate anyone, nor to accuse people falsely, and to be content with their wages (Luke 3:14). These actions would prove the sincerity of their response to John's message.

On the first Pentecost festival following the Lord's resurrection, sinners were told to "Repent and be baptized in the name of Jesus Christ, in order to obtain the remission of sins and you will receive the gift of the Holy Spirit" (Acts 2:38). Sequel to that, the inspired apostle Peter charged the audience by saying, "Save yourselves from this crooked generation" (Acts 2:40).

If one truly believes Jesus is the Christ, the Son of the Living God, repentance will surely follow faith and make it valid before God. So, repent and follow through for the remission of your sins.
