Taras Shevchenko (1814-1861) **Humanistic Poet and National Bard**



The period of Taras Shevchenko's life and creativity – the first half of the 19th century – was the age of humanistic ideals and the exalted aspirations of romanticism that had captivated the

European continent, including Ukraine. A laureate of the Academy of Arts of St. Petersburg and universally recognized poet of Ukraine of that time, Shevchenko was particularly sensitive to those ideals. His soul bore the scars of servitude, and as a son of a people who had suffered intensely at the hands of Tsar Nicholas I, the gendarme of Europe, Shevchenko appreciated the gift of freedom.

A deep sense of human dignity and a profound yearning for freedom emanate from every line of his poetry. He nourished, in addition, a deep love for the innocence and purity of children and reverence for motherhood, for they were the source of his faith in the love of man for man, which alone can inspire true human relations.

Yet his perception of life is thoroughly biblical, after the image of the author of the psalms, and his poetical interpretations of the psalms reveal the unshakeable anchoring of his soul in God's eternal mystery — the meaning of man's divine destiny. Source: *Progress* (Πο*c*τ*y*π)



Everything is Possible for the One Who Believes

ave you ever tried to do something but you couldn't do it? Well, in today's Gospel story, Jesus' disciples needed some help. Listen to what happened...

A large crowd had gathered around the disciples who were having an argument with the religious leaders. Jesus asked them, "What are you arguing about?" A man in the crowd answered, "Teacher, I brought my son. He is possessed by an evil spirit. The evil spirit keeps him from talking. Whenever the evil spirit wants to, it throws him on the ground and makes him foam at the mouth. His whole body becomes extremely stiff. I asked your disciples to help him, but they could not." Once Jesus heard the man, He became upset. He looked at the crowd and said, "You people have no faith. How long must I stay with you? How long must I put up with you? Bring the boy to me." The boy was brought to Jesus. The evil spirit recognized Jesus right away and made the boy fall to the ground. He rolled around and begun to foam at the mouth. The evil spirit knew that Jesus was God's Son and He was very powerful. Jesus asked the father, "How long has the boy been like this?" "Ever since He was little," said the father. "The evil spirit has even thrown him into fire or water to try and kill him. But if you can do anything, please have pity on us."

"If you can?" said Jesus. "Everything is possible for the one who believes." Jesus knew that the boy's father did not quite believe that Jesus could help his son. Had the father truly believed, he would not have used the word "if." Jesus then made the evil spirit leave the boy's body. The spirit yelled and shook his body and came out. The boy laid on the ground and the crowd thought he was dead because he was not moving. Jesus took his hand, lifted him up and the boy stood up! Jesus healed the boy of the evil spirit! After everyone had left, the disciples asked Jesus a question. "Why couldn't we remove the evil spirit from the boy?" Jesus answered, "That kind of spirit can only come out by prayer."

Jesus was teaching them and us something very important. Prayer is powerful, useful, and important. When we pray about something, we are trusting God that He is going to handle whatever it is we are praying about. The father in the story did not have that trust at first. Once Jesus told him he needed to believe, then he decided he was ready to completely trust what Jesus could do. Jesus did something for all people so that we can know Him: He died on the cross and came back to life. If we ask Him to take away our sins and believe in our heart He has given us a new life, He will be with us forever.
