# Love and Service to God since 1960!

Today's Gospel reading is dedicated to the Myrrh-Bearing Women; to the simple women, who on the day following the burial of Christ the Saviour early in the morning hastened to His tomb to anoint the lifeless body of their Teacher with sweet spices.

Why are the Myrrh-Bearing women the first to be honoured with such news? Feminine nature itself presupposes that love and sacrifice are its main quality and its fundamental value. Any woman is by her very nature a mother, whether she is married or not. And a mother is someone who can and ought to take to her heart every single person who is next to her regardless of their gender or age, whether they be virtuous or sinful. And this feminine love with a disregard for deliberations and perplexities triumphs over the gloom and depression that took hold of the disciples and drives the women to act without deliberating.

Unlike the disciples who, following Christ's death upon the cross, went home depressed, despondent, and perplexed as to how they would go on living, the women simply act. They take spices, and as soon as the sun rises they run to the tomb of the Saviour, and - a miracle! They see that the tomb is empty; an Angel meets them and announces to them the joyous news of Christ's resurrection. ~ Archpriest Pavel Velikanov

# An Easter Surprise: The Stone Was Rolled Away

On the Sunday after Jesus was Crucified, Mary Magdalene and another woman named Mary went to visit the tomb where Jesus had been buried. When



they arrived, the stone that had covered the tomb had been rolled away, and an angel was sitting on it. The two women were shocked and a bit afraid.

"Don't be afraid," the angel said to them. "I know you are looking for Jesus who was crucified. He is not here, He has risen, just as He said He would. Come, see the place where He lay. Then go quickly and tell His disciples."

The two Marys looked in and saw that the tomb was empty and hurried away. They were surprised and afraid, but they were filled with joy. As they ran to tell

the disciples, they met Jesus. They ran to Him and grasped Him and worshipped Him.

Jesus said to them, "Don't be afraid! Go tell My brothers to leave for Galilee, and they will see Me there."

Now, that is what I call a real Easter Surprise. They went to see Jesus in the tomb, but He was not there. He was risen! That is why when we see our friends on Easter we greet them by saying, "He is risen!" and our friends reply, "Indeed He is risen!"

Heavenly Father, how we thank you for this glorious celebration of the resurrection of Jesus, our Lord. We are not surprised that the tomb was empty. He has risen just as He said He would. In His name we pray. Amen.

### Why did the women bring spices to anoint the body of Jesus after His burial?



"When the Sabbath was over, Mary Magdalene, Mary the mother of James, and Salome bought spices so that they might go to anoint Jesus' body" (Mark 16:1). The women's visit to the tomb is also mentioned in Matthew 28:1, Luke 24:1, and John 20:1, though Luke is the only other gospel writer to mention the spices they brought with them.

Luke 23:56 adds that, on the day of Jesus' crucifixion, the women "went home and prepared spices and perfumes. But they rested on the Sabbath in obedience to the commandment." John 19:39 reveals that Nicodemus had already used spices on the body of Jesus: "Nicodemus brought a mixture of myrrh and aloes, about seventy-five pounds."

The main reason a dead body was anointed with spices was to control the smell of decomposition. Jews did not practice embalming, and the funeral spices were a way to help minimize unpleasant odours. At the tomb of Lazarus, when Jesus asked for the stone to be rolled away from the mouth of the tomb, Martha objected: "By this time there is a bad odour, for he has been there four days" (John 11:39). The spices the women brought to Jesus' tomb were intended to eliminate such an odour and honour the body of Christ.

The fact that the women brought spices to anoint Jesus' dead body showed they did not expect Jesus to literally rise from the dead. After resting on the Sabbath (Saturday) according to Jewish custom, the women traveled to Jesus' tomb early Sunday morning with plans to provide the traditional spices used on a dead body. This group of women included Mary Magdalene, Mary the mother of James, Salome, Joanna, and possibly others (Luke 24:10). Their primary concern was over how the stone would be moved to allow them entrance to the tomb. When they arrived at the tomb, they were surprised to see the stone already rolled away and no body inside.

In their act of devotion, these faithful and reverent followers of Jesus became the first witnesses of the empty tomb and the first to see Jesus alive again. The spices they brought were unneeded, since Jesus was alive forevermore, but their zealous loyalty to the Saviour was rewarded with the honour of becoming the first eyewitnesses of the resurrected Lord.
