#### LIVES OF THE SAINTS: JOHN THE BAPTIST

JOHN THE BAPTIST was a contemporary of Christ who was known for evangelization and his baptizing of Jesus Christ.

He was born through the intercession of God to Zachariah and Elizabeth, who was otherwise too old to bear children. According to Scriptures, the Angel Gabriel visited Elizabeth and Zachariah to tell them they would have a son and that they should name him John. Zachariah was skeptical and for this he was rendered mute until the time his son was born and named John, in fulfillment of God's will.

When Elizabeth was pregnant with John, she was visited by Mary, and John leapt in her womb. This revealed to Elizabeth that the child Mary carried was to be the Son of God.

John began public ministry around 30 AD, and was known for attracting large crowds across the province of Judaea and around the Jordan River. When Jesus came to him to be baptized, John recognized Him and said, "It is I who need baptism from You." Jesus told John to baptize Him anyway, which he did, whereupon the heavens opened, and the Spirit of God was seen like a dove. The voice of God spoke, saying, "This is my beloved Son, in whom I am well pleased."

John instructed his followers to turn to Christ, calling Him the "Lamb of God" and these people were among the first Christians.

Following his baptism of Christ, John's popularity grew so much that he alarmed King Herod. Herod ordered him arrested and imprisoned. John spoke with Herod on several occasions and condemned his marriage to his halfbrother's wife. This condemnation would be his downfall as King Herod promised to grant a wish to his daughter. In revenge for John the Baptist's condemnation of her mother's scandalous marriage to Herod, she asked for John's head. King Herod reluctantly obliged. He died sometime between 33 and 36 AD. John the Baptist's feast day is June 24, and the anniversary of his death is August 29 and is sometimes celebrated with a second feast.

## Give All Your Worries to Jesus

The Gospel lesson today talks a lot about worry. In life, we have things that we worry about. We worry about being liked by our friends, who will sit by us at lunch, if we'll be good on a sport's team, if something's wrong when we hear family members argue. Some worries seem bigger than others. Some people worry about being sick or being safe. There is a lot of sin in this world and things that the devil tries to get at us with.




But Jesus tells us not to worry. He's taking care of us. He used examples in creation. God gives food to the birds. They don't have to plant it themselves and harvest it. God gives

them their food. We don't need to worry about clothes. Look at how beautiful flowers are. Jesus tells us the King Solomon didn't even have clothes as beautiful as the flowers. If God Cares for things like the birds and flowers, isn't He going to take Care of you?

Worries can weigh us down and keep us from being the person God wants us to be. When we worry, we're not letting God take care of things. It's like we're saying, "I can take care of this, Jesus. Thank you for offering but I got it." Jesus tells us we can always trust Him. We know we can because He always keeps His promises. Now, let's give those worries to Jesus.

Dear Jesus, we give our worries to You. You promise to take care of us and we trust You. We have a lot to worry about but we know You can handle it. You died to take care of our sins. You took care of our big problem of sin and we know that You'll take care of our other problems too. Help us to give our worries over to You and not try and take them back. You can handle anything. We're so glad that we have a God that takes such good care of us. No one is like You. We have nothing to worry about when our life is in Your hands. In Jesus name we pray, Amen.
