Tesus is "the guest of honour" in today's Gospel, both at the gathering hosted by Mary, Martha and their brother Lazarus, and the following day at a parade by people who are en route to the Passover, becoming witnesses of His ministry and miracle. Our Lord enters into Jerusalem on a donkey, not on a royal stallion. He comes not as a conquering king and monarch, but as the lowly Prince of Peace, the gentle King, riding on a donkey, a beast of burden. With the crowd's waving of palm branches and the exclamations of "Hosanna! Save NOW!" the crowds are honouring Jesus as a victor, but several days later, the cross will become Jesus' display of the glory of God's grace and the empty grave on Easter Sunday will be His Emblem of Victory over the power of sin and death. Today, and for ages of ages, may Jesus be our eternal "guest of honour." "Blessed is He Who comes in the name of the Lord! Hosanna in the highest!"





Today, we also celebrate the Feast of the Annunciation, delivered by Archangel Gabriel and accepted by the Virgin,

occurring nine months before the Birth of Christ at Christmas. It is, as the hymns of the Church tell us, the crown of our salvation, the beginning of everything. This is why its Greek name is 'Evangelismos', which comes from the word 'Evangelion' meaning 'Good News'. This is the feast of the Good News, the Feast of the Gospel. Without this Feast, there would have been no Good News, no Gospel. The sacrifice of the Mother of God in accepting to bear and nourish God, giving Him her blood, bones and flesh, and raise Him as a man is such that she alone among all mankind can take us outside the cycle of wars and can lead us, if we wish to follow her, into Eternity, to the Resurrection of Christ.

Readings for Easter Sunday

(to help prepare for the nourishment of the Word of God at Liturgy)

Epistle: Acts of the Apostles 1: 1-8 Gospel: John 1: 1-17

As you read each passage, ask yourself these questions, "What thoughts, ideas, words or images come to mind?" and "What are the connections between them?" This will help make them easier to follow and understand.

DID YOU KNOW... the last time (in the Gregorian calendar) that Easter fell on Sunday, April 1 was the year 1956 (62 years ago). Our local Ukrainian parishes (minus Holy Cross of course) were still following the Julian calendar then, and "Ukrainian" Easter fell on April 23. But the span between the next occurrence of Easter on April 1 will not be quite that long. In fact, Easter will again occur on April 1 in 2029 — that's only 11 years from now — and then 11 years after that in 2040. After that, it won't happen again until 2108 — 68 years later.

There have been a number of suggested reforms for the Easter date. For example, in 1997 the World Council of Churches proposed a reform of the Easter calculation to replace an equation-based method of calculating Easter with direct astronomical observation. This would have solved the Easter date difference between churches that observe the Gregorian calendar and those that observe the Julian calendar. The reform was proposed to be implemented in 2001, but it is not yet adopted.

Lay Your Cloak Before Him

In the day when Jesus lived, many people wore a garment called a cloak. It was a loose outer garment similar to the cape that today's superheroes like Batman, Wonder Woman, and Superman wear. It provided them protection against the harsh winds and blowing sand in the desert. It also provided protection from the hot desert sun. In today's Bible story, we will see a very unusual way the people used their cloaks.

Jesus and His disciples were walking toward Jerusalem and had stopped near a small village. He sent two of His disciples to go on ahead into the village. He told them that when they got there, they would find a donkey and her colt which they were to bring back to Him. Of course, the disciples were a bit concerned because they imagined that these animals might belong to someone who might not appreciate having their animals taken. Jesus simply told them, "Tell them that the Lord needs them and they will let you have them." So, the disciples went into town and sure enough, there was a donkey and her colt. They grabbed them and as they were leaving, someone asked why they were taking the animals. They answered, "It is for the Lord." And the people let them take them just as Jesus had said they would. When they arrived back at the Camp, the disciples took their cloaks and

put them on the donkey to make a nice soft seat for Jesus. Jesus got on the donkey and headed toward Jerusalem.

When Jesus arrived in Jerusalem, a very large crowd gathered to welcome Him. Some of them spread their cloaks on the road for Jesus to ride on, while others cut branches from the palm trees and spread them on the road. Why would they do that? They were treating Jesus like a king!

The Bible tells us that the crowds that went ahead of Him and those that followed shouted: "Hosanna to the Son of David!" 'Blessed is he who comes in the name of the Lord! Hosanna in the highest!"

The people greeted Jesus as a King that day. Today, Jesus wants to be your King -- and He will be if you will allow Him to Come into your heart and rule over your life. Lay down your cloak to greet your King as He Comes to you in love.

Let us pray: Jesus, come into our lives and create in us a new heart. May we excitedly welcome You just as those that awaited Your arrival in Jerusalem did. Thank You for being here with us. We praise You Lord! Amen.
